

# The New Normal: What It's Like During The COVID-19 Pandemic

Our 2020-2021 school year started off 100% virtual learning on September 8, 2020. The instructions provided are significantly different from that offered last spring before the sudden school closure on March 16, 2020. The instruction included a combination of synchronous (online face to face instruction) and asynchronous (online on your time) instruction as well as specific class schedules for students, engaging and meaningful content, and new technology and instructional resources developed by the VDOE through the learning management system, Canvas.



On October 22, 2020, NMS reopened to in-person (hybrid) learning to 94 students while 178 students are learning virtually. The Gold group attends on Mondays and Tuesdays and the Green group attends on Thursdays and Fridays. On Wednesdays, no students report, this is asynchronous learning day.



On December 7, 2020, NMS reopened to the next group of hybrid/in-person learning students. All parents and guardians continue to have the option of choosing 100% virtual learning for their students at any time.



is mailed, letting you and your family know that vou had demonstrated NMS PRIDE.


## **NMS AGAINST BULLYING**

### **TAG STUDENTS BUILDING UNDERWATER ROBOTS**

NMS 6th, 7th & 8th grade TAG students is working on building an underwater Remotely Operated Vehicles (ROVs). Kits and instructions were provided by the SeaPerch program sponsored by the Northumberland Association for Progressive Stewardship (NAPS) which equips the students and Mrs. Shauna McCraine, the instructor with resources to teach engineering concepts, problem solving, teamwork, and technical applications. The SeaPerch's ROV kits are made up of readily available parts and its curriculum covers many aspects of science and engineering. Building a SeaPerch ROV teaches skills useful for ship and submarine design, and encourages students to become familiar with the basics of both naval architecture and marine and ocean engineering. While informing students about the many career opportunities, it also teaches technical procedures and instills the principles of tool safety.





## **Automated External Defibrillator**

NMS has recently received a donation of an new Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) provided by the Mid-County Volunteer Rescue Squad. An AED is a portable, life saving device designed to treat people experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. It can analyze the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, deliver an electrical shock, or defibrillation, to help the heart re-

establish an effective rhythm. So when seconds matter, having an AED readily available is the fastest way to provide life-saving treatment. This is the third AED now visible and available for staff and students to use in an Emergency. Heartfelt thanks goes out to the Mid-County Volunteer Rescue Squad for looking out for our school. A fourth AED is located in the nurses office.



## **Remind Support Hotline**

NCPS Educational Technology Team has implemented a family support hotline for families and the community outside of regular school hours. Staff members from all three schools are assigned and available to receive requests from families. Upon receipt of the request, a staff member will call the family using Remind Voice calls to provide assistance. Mrs. Javornda Ashton, Director of Educational Technology said "Remind is already a great communication tool and now it will be even better". Remind allows for sending of messages via SMS, in-app notifications, email or phone calls

without showing personal contact information and Remind automatically documents the date and time of all calls. Remind is now the official communication platform for NCPS.
