On May 16, 2023, Chief Vega and Sergeant Lemon invited Colonel Harvey Barnum, Jr., Marine Corps Retired, a distinguished speaker to talk to NHS and NMS Cadets and students. Colonel Barnum received the Medal of Honor during the Vietnam War. He was the fourth Marine to receive the medal for actions in Vietnam. Colonel Barnum talked about his days in high school playing football and baseball and being a member of the Boy Scouts of America in Cheshire, Connecticut. He was also president of his Freshman and Senior class at Cheshire High School. He was drawn to the Marine's while attending a military recruiting day as a senior. He said the junior and senior boys were assembled in the school auditorium, with faculty members observing from the rear of the room as each recruiter got up to give his pitch. The Air Force recruiter got up to explain the advantages of joining the United States Air Force. He was greeted with catcalls and whistles from the students. The Army recruiter received the same treatment, as did the Navy recruiter. Then the Marine recruiter a seasoned gunnery sergeant, rose and glared. He said, "there is no one here worthy of being a United States Marine. I'm deplored that the faculty in the back of the

room would let the students carry on like this. There isn't anybody here I want in my Marine Corps." He said, when the recruiter sat back down he was among the students that swarmed around his table. He was sworn into the Marine Corps that same year. He joined a Marine Platoon Leadership Class when he got to St. Anselm College in Manchester, New Hampshire, where he graduated with a degree in economics and then joined the Marine Corps. Colonel Barnum talked about his days when he was a 1st Lieutenant during Operation Harvest Moon. His unit was ambushed by Viet Cong units, his company commander and radio operator were both killed, dismantling the company's command structure and communications capabilities. With no other officers in the company, it was up to him to take command. He retrieved the radio and informed the battalion commander of the situation. He stood on a tall knoll, exposed to enemy fire on all sides, and directed air strikes by pointing his arms towards enemy positions. When his troops crossed a narrow and deep river, he was the last member of his company to cross the water to safety. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions on December 18, 1965, for "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty". Thank you Colonel Harvey Barnum, Jr., Marine Corps Retired, for your service and sacrifice for our country and also for a most needed inspirational talk to our students.

Mr. Cockrell's 7th grade History class learned about the Vietnam War. The students learned that the United States (U.S.) was afraid that communism would spread to South Vietnam and then the rest of Asia. Therefore, President Truman sent the Military Assistance Advisory Group (Navy, Army and Air Force) to Vietnam to supervise the use of \$10 million worth of U.S. military equipment to support South Vietnam in their effort to fight North Vietnam from 1954 - 1964. Then the Gulf of Tonkin Incident, also known as the U.S.S. Maddox incident, marked the formal entry of the United States into the Vietnam War (U.S.S. Maddox was attacked by North Vietnamese patrol torpedo boats, leading President Johnson to call for air strikes on North Vietnamese patrol boat bases). The U.S. were fully involved in the Vietnam War from 1964 - 1973 and there were 58 220 U.S. military fatal casualties involved in the Vietnam War from 1964 - 1973 and there were 58,220 U.S. military fatal casualties. Mr. Cockrell also shared with his students artifacts he has collected over the years, such as canteens, sunglasses, sleeping bags, combat equipment, etc.


